**Behind-the-Scenes: Recreating an Iconic** Scene from "The Sandlot"

This year, "The Sandlot" celebrates its 25th Anniversary, so we thought it only fitting to pay tribute to the iconic baseball film by recreating a scene from it earlier this spring.

Poor, unsuspecting Christian Yelich, whose locker is situated between the two, got roped in by proximity. The new guy on the team, he'd been in the clubhouse for just a couple of days at that point. When he got pulled into the conversation, it was probably very tough for him to say no to the peer pressure, especially once we convinced him he would be the perfect Benny the Jet.

"Wow, that's a lot of pressure," Christian said, alluding to the fact that


everybody loves Benny the Jet.

But the fact that all of these guys stayed after practice for as long as they




right, and encouraged everyone else to focus and up their game as well.
